| Sir Harry Gibbs Law Scholarship | New applicant or existing resident Second year or above law student (including post graduate students) | Created in 2006 and awarded for outstanding results and a desire to make a positive contribution to the life of the College. It is expected that the student will pursue a career in the law and will act as an ambassador for the College. Background: The scholarship is named after the late Right Honourable Sir Harry Gibbs , GCMG, AC, KBE. Born in 1917 in Queensland, he was educated at Ipswich Grammar and at Emmanuel College, The University of Queensland, where he graduated in Arts (1937) and Law (1939). Sir Harry was admitted to the Queensland Bar in 1939, and served in the AMF (1939–1942) and in the AIF (1942–1945). He was appointed a QC in 1957, a Judge of the Queensland Supreme Court in 1961, a Judge of the Federal Court of Bankruptcy in 1967, and a Justice of the High Court of Australia in 1970. He was Chief Justice of the High Court from 1981 to 1987. In his retirement, Sir Harry worked tirelessly for the cause of a Constitutional Monarchy and produced a number of critically acclaimed papers in this area. He was a Fellow of Emmanuel College and Patron of the Emmanuel College Foundation until his death in June 2005 aged 88. Sir Harry Gibbs was one of Emmanuel's most outstanding graduates and a strong supporter of the collegiate ideal. | of fees up | 1 |

| Dr Diana Cavaye Scholarship | New applicant in third year or above at UQ (including post graduate students) Existing resident with significant period of residence (including post graduate students) | Created in 2006 by the family of Dr Diana Cavaye, a dedicated supporter and Honorary Fellow of Emmanuel College, and awarded for academic excellence and service to others. The scholarship may be used for any scholarly purpose including fees, travel, attendance at a conference, and accommodation or research expenses. Within one month after the termination of the scholarship, the Diana Cavaye Scholar must submit a report to the Principal on all activities undertaken during tenure of the scholarship and, if appropriate, address the College residents describing the advantages of the scholarship. The report is to be made available to the students and in due course deposited with the directors who will maintain an archive of the reports. Scholarship recipients are expected to correspond with their benefactors at least twice a year. New applicant: An outstanding student enrolled at The University of Queensland who: • is at least in their third year of a degree at UQ, or • has already graduated and is undertaking a postgraduate degree or diploma at UQ, and • is applying for residence at Emmanuel College. Existing Emmanuel College resident: An outstanding student who has been resident at Emmanuel College for a significant period and: • is either continuing to work for a degree at UQ, or • has already graduated from UQ and is engaged in postgraduate studies, and • is residing at Emmanuel College having already achieved significant academic success and service to others elsewhere. His teaching career began as a trainee teacher at Thornburgh and Blackheath Colleges, Charters Towers, from 1945 to 1946. He taught at Brisbane Boys' College (BBC) from 1948 to 1955 and at Phillips Academy, Massachusetts, USA, in 1973. He assumed an administrative career when he was appointed Principal of Thornburgh and Blackheath Colleges (1956 to 1973; Interim Principal 1974) and BBC from 1974 to 1989 and again in 1996. Graham taught generations of BBC students about the value of participation and "having a go". Graham was inducted into the fellowship of Emmanuel College in 2009 and the fellowship of International House in 2010. He was Development Director at Stuartholme School from 2006 to 2011 and has acted as Honorary Advancement Advisor at Emmanuel. Graham is a Life Member of the Australian College of Educators. He was a practising solicitor in Mackay, his home town, where he was on the board of Lifeline, a committee member of the Marriage Guidance Council and was the local branch President of the Liberal Party. He instituted the first Law Week in Mackay, where free legal advice booths were provided to the public. | Lucy Morris Stevens Scholarship | New applicant or existing resident studying Drama/ Theatre/ Performance or English in second year or above (including post graduate students) | The scholarship is named after the late Lucy Morris Stevens and is provided by a bequest from her husband, the late Mr James McMillan Dunn Stevens. Mr Stevens stipulated that the award be: "In memory of Lucy Morris Stevens who wrote and produced plays and pageants for girls and women in Brisbane between 1929 and 1965, bequeathed by her husband James McMillan Stevens a former Chairman of the Council of Emmanuel College." | | | Dr John Lovick Corbett BSc (Agric), MAgrSci, DSc, AM (1926–2003) was born in England and completed his first degree at Reading University in 1946. He was awarded a scholarship for postgraduate study at Massey Agricultural College (now Massey University) in New Zealand where he gained a Master of Agricultural Science with first class Honours. He went on to establish a research program on the nutrition of grazing animals at Rowett Research Institute in Aberdeen, and returned to Australia in 1963 to join the CSIRO Pastoral Research Laboratory at Armidale to study digestion of feed and energy expenditure in ruminants. He published more than 100 scientific papers and monographs and was awarded the degree of Doctor of Science by Massey University in 1968. In 2002 Dr Corbett's many achievements were recognised when he was appointed as a Member of the Order of Australia for his services to agricultural science, livestock grazing research and animal production, and to the community of Armidale Dumaresq. Dr Corbett was incredibly supportive of his family members in their educational pursuits, and was himself committed to philanthropy in collegiate education. | | |
